1. Meeting called to order at 1:03 by Karla Reesor. Roll call for quorum.

Karla Reesor read the land acknowledgement.

In consideration of the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions' Calls to Action, it is with respect, and in the spirit of reconciliation and truth, the Peace River Area Monitoring Program honours and acknowledges that wherever we may be joining today's virtual meeting from here in Alberta, there exists the territories of indigenous peoples which they graciously share with us. Some of those territories are identified in Treaties 6, 7 and 8 – and others are the subject of ongoing and unextinguished claims against the crown. We respectfully acknowledge the traditional and ancestral territories of many diverse Indigenous peoples such as the Cree, Dene, Beaver, Kainia, Piikani, Siksika, Saulteaux, Nakota Sioux, Stoney Nakoda, Tsuu T'ina, and the Metis Nation. We acknowledge and give thanks to the many Indigenous Nations who have lived in and cared for these lands for generations and the many others whose histories, languages, and cultures continue to influence our communities. We are dedicated to ensuring the spirit of all Treaties are honoured and respected and we support the positive development of Nation to Nation relationships between Indigenous Nations and Canada wherever possible.

We also recognize that principles and regulation of land use, resource development, and the associated and responding environmental protections which have followed, have all developed over the course of time, in the same political climate and colonial context that gave rise to the residential school system and other processes of cultural genocide. We recognize, that in many cases, environmental protection regimes may have failed to consider or respect the rights and dignity of Indigenous peoples and their use of the land, and that work associated with environmental protection related to resource development may have relied on methods and epistemologies that are harmful or dismissive of Indigenous science and knowledge. In so acknowledging these failings, we as professionals and advocates for environmental protection can commit to doing better.

So, in the spirit of meaningful reconciliation, I encourage all of us to reflect on these ideas deeply in our work ensuring it is considerate and respectful of the customs, cultures, knowledge, and legal orders of those Indigenous Nations whose territory we share today and every day.

- Could possibly eliminate either THC of CH4
